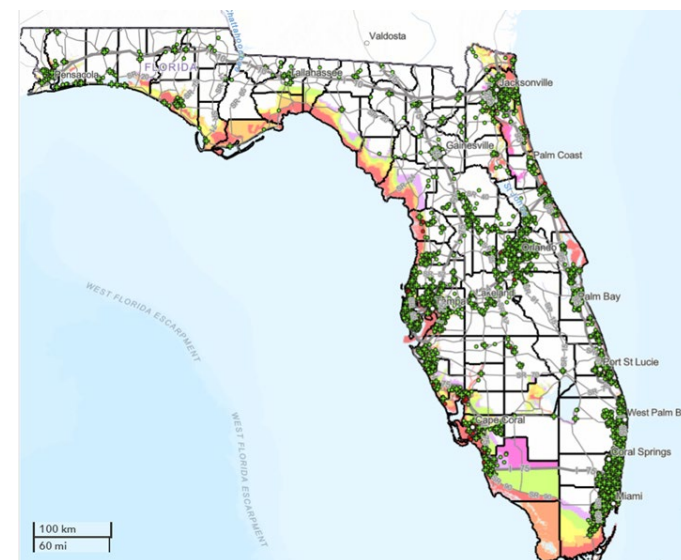

Current Situation:

- State EOC Activation Level – 1
- Many rivers across the Peninsula and Northeast Florida are in or are forecast to reach moderate to major flood stage over the next several days. Several rivers reached or continue to run at above-record flood levels. Riverine flooding will likely continue, despite the absence of rainfall in the forecast.
- Invest 91L (East of Windward Islands) and Invest 92L (Eastern Atlantic) pose no threat to Florida at this time but continue to monitor the tropical wave nearing the Windward Islands.
- Florida rivers, creeks, and waterways continue to run at high levels. West Florida waterways have generally crested and look to slowly recede over the coming days.

- Support evacuation and patient movement operations in area of impact.
- Support stabilization of affected areas.
- Support stabilization and opening of CHDs and State-owned FDOH facilities.
- Provide for responder safety and support.

ESF-8 IMT Key Activities

The ESF-8 Incident Management Team is focused on the following key activities:

- Supporting health care facility evacuations due to wind and flooding damage.
- Supporting discharge planning for remaining shelters for persons with special needs.
- Supporting decompression of health care facilities in affected counties.
- Continuing health care facility assessments in Lee, Charlotte, Collier, and Sarasota counties.
- Supporting environmental health strike teams to conduct assessments in Lee, St. Johns, Collier, Manatee, Sarasota, Hendry, Charlotte, and Highlands.
- Supporting stabilization and opening of CHDs and State-owned FDOH facilities.

Epidemiology: All systems are functioning. No other new outbreaks and no new food or waterborne disease incidents associated with Hurricane Ian have been reported.

Emergency Medication Refills: Effective September 24, 2022 (EO# 22-218, 22-219), Florida pharmacists may dispense up to a 30-day refill of maintenance medication for patients in the areas or counties affected by an emergency declaration or hurricane warning ([section 252.358, Florida Statutes](#)). Early prescription refill provisions are in effect. However, this statutory allowance specifically prohibits dispensation of a medicinal drug listed in Schedule II appearing in chapter 893 and is not permitted under section 465.0285, Florida Statutes
